This is the last time I shall write "From The ectory" whilst I am the Rector of the united benefice f Wateringbury with Teston and West Farleigh. Truda nd I have lived among you for over 13 years. She oins me in saying a deep and sincere "Thank You" for he kindness and co-operation we have received over hose years, during which time we have met many lovely copie and made many lasting friendships. Fortunately e are not moving too far away so I anticipate meeting any from these parushes when performing the mundane out necessary chore of shopping in the Maidstone area.

I expect a number of you are curious about what is coing to happen - how long before another Rector is ppointed - where will he live - and so on. I undertand the position to be as follows, although I am not party to the arrangements. In the near future a 'Priest in Charge" will be appointed to administer hese three parishes, possibly for several years, before a more permanent appointment is made. This rrangement will afford the Bishop time to fully ssess the needs of this area in light of the quite extensive changes facing the Church of England. A riest in Charge will be, to all intents and purposes, your Rector, and the man concerned will perform his luties much as I have. My personal assessment is that an appointment is likely to be made in the Autumn. In the meantime the Churchwardens will be responsible for seeing that the weekly services are properly conducted. That will be done through the direction and the support of the Rural Dean. Parents seeking the Baptism of their baby or anyone wishing to marry or to have Banns salled should contact the Churchwardens.

Thank you for all your friendship and fellowship over the last 13 years: may you be as kind to my successor.
