ONCE MORE ROMANIA

By the time you read this I shall be in Romania again setting up a training workshop at one of the orphanages. This is to be a pioneer project so that the boys, instead of being moved at an early age to an adult institution, may be trained for useful employment at the orphanage at which they will have spent many years.

The course, which is to be at Fierbinti, a small rural village, will be on tractor servicing and repair. The syllabus will be based on the British City and Guilds standard and has the backing of the Romanian Government. If the scheme proves successful we shall establish further courses and similar facilities will be developed in other orphanages.

Our charity, with help from a number of British firms, is supplying the equipment and tools for this project, most of which should have arrived at Pierbinti by the time I get there on the 28th. Accompanying me will be a retired agricultural lecturer (previously Head of Engineering at Brinsbury College West Sussex) who knows all about the subject to be taught.

Our priorities will be to ensure that the workshop area is properly arranged and equipped; that adequate security is provided for the tools; that the Romanian lecturers understand the organisation of the syllabus; and that appropriate arrangements are made for testing and assessing the trainees. We hope that our trip (ending 9th October) will be a further step forward in bringing some enlightenment to the care of the disadvantaged children of Romania.
