THE FIGHT AGAINST CRIME

At the Pa ish Council meeting in the Tickled Trout on 7 December, Police Constable
Mark Wells gave a good account of how the Police are guarding our interests. He now
shares his constabulary duties with another, PC Nick Sparks, with whom he works a
shift system covering East and West Farleigh and Coxheath. Between them they maintain a full programme of orime prevention and detection which has proved productive
but leaves very little time for walking round and meeting the people.

For instance, they operate road checks which involve stopping vehicles. Over a period they have effected one arrest per check session. General arrests have been at the rate of one every three days. Crimes are varied but, as an example, there have been 12 burglaries and 14 thefts from cars recorded in West Farleigh in the last year.

Garden sheds are still a favourite target for criminals with their valuable contents of lawn mowers and expensive tools which sell well at boot sales. A popular spot among car thieves to abandon their stolen vehicles is Kettle Lane. Prompt reporting is always helpful to Police, so ring them on 690055 or 608129 or, of course, if it's urgent, that well known panic station 999.

Finally, would any budding Inspector Morse or Miss Marple like to take over as Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator from Jill Morgan, who has been soldiering on now for far too long and is anxious to hand over to someone else?
