FORTY DAYS AND FORTY NIGHTS THE REVD DENYS GOWER

"We would do well to remember that the true glories of our own civilisation were built on the proposition that real freedom comes : into his new parishes at from denying self, not constantly seeking to gratify it."

These were the concluding words of a series of articles recently in a popular daily newspaper. They are well worth some consideration, especially at the time of year known to Christians as LENT.

Self indulgence leads only to the slavery of sin and the agonies of a guilty conscience, as well as an unsafe and unhappy world.

BIRD WATCHING CORNER

Do you remember that nest of kestrels last year in one of the arrow slit windows of the church tower? Young church-goers climbed up into the bell chamber to watch the four young birds as they thrived under the loving care of their parents. They provided a lesson, not only in parent/child relationship, but also in the stark reality of nature in the raw. Many small birds, mice and voles died so that those kestrels could live and many were the pathetic little discarded remnants of their bodies on the ground beneath the nest. It was hard to balance the appeal of the attractive young chicks in the nest with the deaths of all those little animals which provided their food.

Well, Spring is here again and the kestrels are again looking for a convenient ledge on which to raise a family. George Reffell reports seeing a kestrel round the church tower, perhaps prospecting for a nest site, though this bird was being mobbed by rooks. Such mobbing is not unusual and kestrels can deal with that sort of thing. So I wouldn't be surprised if, once again, young attenders at church will be able to follow the adventures of yet another family of these beautiful but fierce wild things as they accept the hospitality of our lovely old church.

I wonder how many other nests those old walls can remember from their 900 years of existence.
