Working the System

As I put these thoughts on paper, I realise that Eileen and I have been here just about six weeks. In a strange way it seems much longer (it will be longer by the time you read this). At all three churches and in all three parishes you have been most velcoming and friendly.

Parishes are, of course, very different and the three parishes of this Benefice all have their own identity and character. As a very green Reader, some years ago, I remember preaching a sermon in which I said the parish system was redundant. Time has proved me (not for the first or last time) to be wrong. The system is far from perfect but it does provide a network of worship and pastoral care that touches many people at many points during their lifetimes, baptisms, marriages and funerals being perhaps the main occasions when they come into contact with their parish church and its minister.

In the matter of marriage, at least one partner of the couple concerned must have a place of residence within one of our three parishes.

Baptism is the responsibility of the minister within a parish. In our three parishes there are two questions for those thinking about baptism:

- 1. Do you reside within the three parishes?
- 2. Do you live outside the three parishes yet worship regularly in one of our churches?

If the answer is 'yes' to one or both of these questions, then you will be invited to a Baptism Preparation evening where further arrangements will be made. You will also be welcome to share in our Sunday worship.

If you have made a home outside the Benefice, then your first port of call is to the minister of your new parish, although you may have family ties here.

Please speak to me. If I can help, I will.
