VILLAGE AFFAIRS AND A VISIT FROM THE MAYOR

The next Parish Council meeting will be held at the Good Intent on Monday, 6 DECEMBER (not November). It will be rather a special one because the Mayor of Maidstone, Councillor Paul Oldham, will be there. He should have an interesting meeting.

The meeting is also open to parishoners who take an interest in village affairs. Matters for discussion should include an up-date on the Village Hall saga. The latest that Life-Line has to report about this is that charitable status for the fund has been applied for and a decision is awaited - high time, really, because the fund has been in existence now for ten years.

Other things for discussion include improvements to Vicarage Corner, that is, the junction between Teston Lane and Lower Road, which is certainly ripe for improvement. Traffic calming or a 30 miles an hour speed limit may also come under discussion.

Also there is the question of the footpath between Charlton Lane and Kettle Lane which was last reported on in the February Life-Line. Agreement for the continued use of the footpath has been reached, provided that:-

Stiles are erected at each end with "Residents Only. Dogs to be kept under control" signs. The route is un-fenced.

The agreement is to be enshrined in a formal document which should settle any misunderstandings.
