Albert Smith died, early in July, in Newton Abbott.

He will be remembered in West Farleigh as a long standing member of the Sports Club of which he was a committee member from 1950 to 1980. He was Football Captain from 1950 to 1957 and treasurer from 1957 to 1980. He was made a life member of the Club in 1980.

We now have a village sign. It stands proudly on a stout pole at the apex of the Green where Charlton Lane meets Ewell Lane. Painted by Clive Stevens, it depicts a farm worker (some say it's John Day) chewing a straw and contemplating a scene which includes the bridge, sheep, some well ordered fields, a thatched roof, the church and a couple of oast roundels.

Apart from announcing to the world that this is West Farleigh, the provision of the sign marks the one hundredth anniversary of the formation of the Parish Council, a body dedicated to public service.

On Sunday, 10th July, a service was held on the Green by the new sign. There were 50 people there which isn't a bad turn-out for a village where the total population is less than 400. The altar was four straw bales. Conducted by Denys Gower, the service was beautiful in its simplicity. Music was supplied by Abbie and Hannah Walsh, Sophie Barnwell and Natalie Ward playing their recorders. It was perfect in the open air and beautifully performed. Some character tooted his horn as he went by in his car. That wasn't so musical but was taken to be a token of support.

The dedication was spoken by Denys. The village congratulates Clive Stevens on his superb, historic Aug 7 0930 BCP MP and meaningful product.
