### HELP IS AT HAND

There is a new service called the Maidstone Staying Put Agency whose aim it is to help elderly or disabled homeowners to cope with repairs to their homes and live in comfort and safety. It seems to be a generous scheme in which people can be helped in a variety of ways. The list includes damp-proofing, re-wiring, loft insulation, bathroom fittings, replacement windows, downstairs toilets. For disabled people there are grab rails, stair lifts and purpose built showers.

Funding comes from the Maidstone Borough Council Housing Directorate, Kent Social Services and an organisation called Hyde Community Services Ltd of Lee Green , London.

If you want to know more, David Swan has some leaflets or you can phone 765496. Grants are available so, if you would like some work done and paying for it is a problem, phone up and a quick check will reveal whether a grant can be made in your case.

# Environmental Matters

The next "freighter" for your bulk rubbish will be on the Green on Friday, 24 February, from 0945 to 1145. This new system of picking up large items of rubbish by means of a freighter instead of an un-attended skip has been adopted by the Borough Council because certain dangerous items such as asbestos have been left in the skips. As pointed out in the Kent Messenger, however, anyone with asbestos and the like to get rid of, being deprived of a skip and being too idle to make special arrangements for its disposal, will be sorely tempted to dump it in some out-of-theway spot. This is not a criticism of the rubbish disposal authorities in Maidstone. It must have been a hard decision to bring in the freighter system instead of the skips. And in recent cases of dumping in the village the authorities have been very prompt and efficient in getting rid of it as soon as it was drawn to their attention. It is difficult to plumb the minds of those who dump rubbish (assuming they have minds) in public places instead of taking it to the municipal dump in Tovil.

Should you find a load of rubbish dumped in some lonely spot, ring 602162 for it to be got rid of. And if you catch someone in the act of dumping, take their vehicle number and ring the Police.
