### LOOKING FOR PROOF

"I don't believe it!" That exclamation is often heard on the lips of Victor Weldrew, that unhappy gentleman in the TV programme One Foot in the Grave. Thomas, one of Jesus's friends, said very much the same thing when the other desciples told him that Jesus had survived death and had appeared to them. "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were and put my hand into his side, I will not believe." (John 20:25)

The main source of belief for the Christian is found, of course, in the Gospels. There are four sketches of the life, ministry, death and resurction of Jesus. They do not fit neatly over each other and the events and characters do not always match up in the narratives. So how can we believe them? They were written by very different people at different times in different places from the reflections and memories of people who witnessed at first hand the life and ministry of Jesus. Belief is passed on from one generation to another but it is not always neatly gift wrapped.

If Jesus ever wrote anything it has never been discovered but we discover the person of Jesus through the writings of others. In discovering Jesus we discover something about the nature of God and His relationship to us. The Coapels cannot prove the presence of God like a mathematical formula but, if you want proof that Jesus knew a great deal about our human condition and our need of God's presence in our lives, read Matthew, Chapter 5, verses 1 to 12. When you have read it, 1 wonder, will you say, "I don't believe it!"
