Visits were made at the morning rush hour to the 3 traffic problem spots in the village on 27 November to see what could be done. The locations were (1) the junction of Lower Road and Ewell Lane, (2) the junction of Lower Road and Teston Lane and (3) junction of Charlton Lane and Ewell Lane. Mr Wilf Shilling, our County Councillor, was there with members of the Parish Council and they watched as vehicles raced round these blind corners at the density of 750 an hour. After watching the phenomenon aghast for a while, those present came up with some sensible suggestions; mini roundabouts at locations (1) and (2); "Slow" notices on the roads at location (3) and a notice "Unsuitable for heavy goods vehicles" at the start of Heath Road. The roundabouts are clearly the most urgent need but, as Mr Shilling pointed out, the question of shortage of money raises its ugly head. It is to be hoped that we don't have to wait for a fatal accident before there is any action.
