After a week off came a dreaded "double header" (two games in one afternoon) v Loose Hangers; we lost the first 3 - 0 but we did improve and deservedly managed a 2 - 2 draw in the second. Finally, after having another Saturday off we played top-of-the-table Cherry Tree. In the first half we took a surprise 1 - 0 lead only for our opponants to draw level just before H/T. A Guy Wilson goal mid way through the second made it 2 - 1 and only an equalising goal three minutes from time prevented a major upset, drawing 2 - 2.

Our 2nd XI, in their quest to conquer the 4th Div championship, and two cup competitions, have had a disappointing month. Needing to win all our remaining league matches, we started well, beating lowly Leeds 4 - 0 and Oaktree Eagles 1 - 0 but came unstuck v Malgo, only drawing 2 - 2, thus losing the chance of winning the League. Still, with two games left, three more points would ensure promotion in 2nd place.

Our semi-final v 3rd Div club Lashings in the Benevolent Cup was a one sided affair and we deservedly lost 5 - 0. Finally came our much awaited challenge Group C cup final v East Malling. Martin Bromley broke the deadlock after 20 minutes, only for our opponents to draw level before H/T. After the break we were awarded a penalty which Martin Hazelwood converted. Then, after missing good chances, 10 mins from time disaster happened. We conceded a very disputed penalty which they scored and with minutes left another disputed free kick enabled East Malling to seal a 3 - 2 scoreline.
