She explained that during WWII money used to be collected by the people of West Farleigh and sent to those from the village who were serving in the forces. The list of names was a list of those who had gratefully received these gifts and had written to express their thanks. The letters themselves had been gathered together in a folio by the Vicar's wife, Lady Lucy Bentinok, and are now in the County archives. The folio was found by Mrs Bygrave among the effects of her late husband who was an antique dealer. The list of names contains several who are still resident like George Reffell and Roly Day.
