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EGGS AND ASHES

Well before the tinsel and the Christmas lights had been removed our local shop, like many others, was selling chocolate eggs, a reminder, if we needed one, that Lent and Easter are not so far away. This is not a groan about commercialisation of the Christian seasons but an observation of how time seems to be dashing along at an ever greater rate of knots.

Ash Wednesday falls on 25 February this year; it marks the first day of Lent. The day derives its name from the imposition of ashes on the foreheads of worshippers in the liturgy of the day. It has its origins in the 10th century but it is a simple ceremony that has meaning for those of us who live in the last years of the 20th century. The sign of the cross in ash, made from the palm crosses of the previous year, reminds us of our mortality and that each one of us is capable of unkind thoughts, words and deeds.

Ash Wednesday begins the penitential season of Lent leading into Holy Week. For many Christians this is a hard time of the year because we find ourselves moving with Jesus towards Jerusalem and attempting through word and sacrament to share in His suffering and passion. If you have yet to experience taking part in the Ash Wednesday Service of Ashing, there will be two opportunities, 11am at West Farleigh and 8pm at Wateringbury.

"Lent" is Old English for "Spring" so, although it is a penitential season, it also reminds us that winter is beginning to retreat. New life is stirring in the earth and before we know it the proper time for Easter Eggs will be upon us.
