CHILDHOOD . "WE PASS THIS WAY BUT ONCE

"If anything good can come out of this, it may be that the publicity can teach people how horrible youngsters and sometimes adults can be to each other." These are the words of the Derby and South Derbyshire coroner, spoken after a little girl had taken her own life. She was driven to this act by being tormented at school and treated like "a little slave" at home. In that "home" she was pelted with eggs and margerine. What a sad and miserable life she must have experienced.

There is this streak in our human nature that comes out in some people - a streak of cruelty that manifests itself in some domestic situations. I often find myself praying for children who are misused and abused, children led into pornography, crime and drugs. I had a reasonabl childhood, apart from being somewhat disturbed by the 2nd World War, and I hope you can say the same. But for some people childhood is like a passage through Holl and, if they survive, they enter adulthood as wounded and bitter men and women.

When I take the Assembly at Wateringbury School or officiate at our Family Services or lead a service of baptism I give thanks for all the happy and healthy children who are present at these events. But I also often pray for those thousands of children in the world like Kelly Yeomans who found her childhood too heavy a cross to bear. Will you take a moment of your time and pray for the children of the world or for a child near you? Denys Gower
