OUR NEW ORGAN

The new church organ was put through its paces at the pre-Christmas services. It was heard in all its glory at the service of lessons and carols on 20 December when the capacity congregation sang heartily to its grand sound

The total cost of the organ and acoustic system was £25,000. By a huge effort from many generous people, all but £3,000 of this has already been raised and for this the PCC are most grateful. It remains now to finish the task in 1999.

There will be opportunities for everyone to hear the new organ at two concerts in the New Year. The first, on Saturday, 16 Jan at 2.30pm, will be by our own organist. Philip Moore. He will take us on a musical exploration of the organ with a programme to suit all ages. Philip will explain as well as play so we shall learn a lot. It is hoped that all who have helped to raise money will come and the price has been kept to a modest £3.50 or £1.50 for children. Buy your tickets in advance. You may find it cold to queue at the door. Tickets from Lesley Cushing on 812341. Light refreshments will be available.

The second concert is at an early stage of planning but will be the official Inaugural Concert on Saturday, 22 May, at 7.30pm. We have been fortunate in securing the services of Roger Sayer, the organist at Rochester Cathedral, who has performed at prestigious venues such as the Festival Hall.
