There are hopes that the road works in Lower Road will be completed earlier than projected. (Clancy Dockwra's water main renewal project described in our last edition). It appears that the opportunity arose for the contractors to pass the new pipe down the centre of the old one. This technique would have appreciably shortened the job time, but some sharp bends in the existing cast iron pipe made it necessary only partially to adopt this method and to dig some more holes.

Nevertheless if the road can be re-opened before November 8th it will represent an improvement on the 8 weeks closure from October 6th which was the official timetable. At the end of the work it will be vitally necessary to have safety checks on the water quality; these take a few days. Our picture shows the **Tickled Trout** nestling in its dip behind just some of the works. The pub/restaurant – to which, along with other properties on Lower Road, access has always been maintained— has managed to keep its trade up well during the times of difficult access and is grateful for the loyalty of its many customers, but it will be relief to all when the works are complete.

Most adversely affected by diverted traffic has been Charlton Lane, where there has often been difficulty in accommodating two streams. For instance, at least one householder had an ornamental planter smashed by traffic which mounted the pavement - and beyond. Let us hope that the last days of work in Lower Road proceed as well as anticipated...

November Pastoral letter contributed by the Rev. Peter Walker Dear Friends.

'God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself' (2 Cor 5:19)
'Without vision the people perish' (Proverbs 29:18)

You know the saying - you wait for the bus which never seems to come, and then three come along at once.

I have just attended two conferences within the space of two weeks. The first was actually a retreat for the clergy of the Malling Deanery. It was organised by our Rural Dean, Jim Brown of East Malling. The retreat was led by Bishop Brian and the venue was a retreat house about one hour's journey from Calais. Four cars transported the twelve clergy to Dover and thence to the ferry for the 75 minute crossing. Bishop Brian gave us a number of talks on the subject of 'reconciliation'. His Lent book on this subject is being published in late November. One phrase which stuck with me was: 'when one fails to forgive another, it imprisons both the unforgiven person and you'. It reminded me of something similar I learnt a long time ago: 'to be unforgiving towards another is as if one locks that person in prison and throws away the key'. The Scriptures tell us: 'God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself'. Again, Jesus tells us to be reconciled one to another.

It's often a hard lesson to learn and carry out! We need to seek God's grace to be our help in all such times.

A week later another ship came along – it was the 'Black Prince' sailing from Liverpool to Dublin. It was the occasion of the Annual Conference of CVM (Christian Vision for Men). This was an opportunity for some of our '5P Men's group' in the United Benefice to attend this. Six of us hurtled up the motorway in a hired people-carrier to board the ship and enjoy two days of excellent teaching, worship and fellowship. There was also the opportunity to visit the city of Dublin. 'Band of Brothers' was the theme and it was certainly that as some 300 men came together.

The vision, which had its beginnings 15 years ago with Max Sinclair (who lives near Sevenoaks) has as its goal 'to win the men of this country for Christ'. It seems an impossible vision, but over the years many have come to know the Lord Jesus as a reality through this organisation's passion. The 5P group affiliated to CVM earlier this year and we are grateful to Mike Marsh of Coxheath for his heading up this and organising events throughout the year to bring men together.

There is a statistic which brings home to us the need for men to come to faith. That is, that if a man comes to Christ there is near a 90% probability to bring his family to Jesus than any other member of that family. The Harvest is indeed ripe!

T'M GETTING MARRIED IN THE MORNING' - BUT WHERE?

The Church of England has been considering for some time widening the choice of places in which couples can marry. In July 2007, the General Synod passed the Church of England Marriage Measure and it received the Royal Assent on 22nd May. The Archbishops have now signed an instrument bringing all the provisions of the Measure into force from 1st October 2008.



The Measure seeks to respond to changing social conditions and in particular to the increasing mobility of our society today. It does not affect the existing right of parishioners. A couple continue to have the right to be married in the parish church of a parish where one or more of them is resident or entered on the electoral roll. The object of the Measure is to grant couples the same right to marry in the parish church of a parish with which one or more of them can demonstrate a "qualifying connection" of a kind specified in the new legislation as a person resident in the parish would have. A person has a Qualifying Connection with a parish If-

that person was baptised in the parish or had his or her confirmation entered in a church register book of a church or chapel in the parish; or has at any time had his or her usual place of residence in the parish for at least 6 months; or has at any time habitually attended public worship in the parish for at least 6 months;

or if-

a Parent of that person has at any time during that person's lifetime; had his or her usual place of residence in the parish for at least 6 months; or has habitually attended public worship in the parish for at least 6 months;

or if-

a Parent or Grandparent of that person was married in the parish.

COURSE OF FOOTPATH IMPEDED

TRACING ANCESTORS

N.B. Peter's day off is Monday; David's is Friday.

Towards the end of October we were away in the North of England (at least if the Peak District qualifies as the North) and I noted a small flock of Fieldfares feeding on some hawthorns which were laden with berries. These were the first winter visitors I have seen so far, although the forecast for harsh weather in the last few days of October may mean that they are here in Farleigh by the time you read this but they were certainly not apparent to me on my latest walk up to Quarry Wood after our return, Fieldfares, and their smaller cousins the Redwing, are members of the thrush family and arrive in numbers of 2 million or so each autumn. They fly from Scandinavia and points eastward (but generally no further east than the Karelia district, as the Siberian birds go to more Mediterranean regions) to winter in our less frostbound woods and fields. It is thought that the first to arrive, in the north, actually come straight across the North Sea from Norway, while in the South-east we get mainly Swedish birds. My first autumn sighting dates for the last five years going backwards have been as follows: 12th Nov. 20th Nov. 23rd Nov.

3rd Nov. and 25th October. In each case these have been birds in the trees of Quarry Wood and sometimes I have seen them in Farleigh beforehand.

We do have very good numbers here. The flocks are generally 200 or more strong. What attracts them above all are the orchards. The ungathered apples on the trees or more especially on the ground draw them like a magnet and, depending on the size of the crop (and the extent to which it is harvested!) keep them around here until February or March. They sit in the tall trees between feeding and make a mixed sound of squawks, croaks, cackles and whistles which blends to a continuous murmur when heard from any distance. The haws that are the first choice food of the northern birds are depleted most years by the time the fieldfares arrive, and in any case we do not have so many around here. The birds also eat worms and a variety of other animal matter-which of course can flourish among decaying apples.

One other thing I have observed is that when the fieldfares are around, a large female sparrowhawk is not far away. If the local population is, as I have suggested, 200 or more ,then a sparrowhawk could perhaps take a third of them over the winter , which could effectively play a major role in keeping the population stable!

Two services at unusual times this month: first the **Patronal Festival** at 9.15 am on November 2nd – All Saints Day being celebrated then, and our Church being dedicated to **All Saints**. The recently bereaved will be invited to light a candle in memory of their loved ones. Secondly **Remembrance Day**, this year on November 9th, will be observed at a quarter to eleven, as usual. Those from this village who sacrificed their lives in the two world wars are remembered by name (**Lest We Forget**) so if you have any connections with them, or with any serving in the military subsequently, why not make a point of attending this rather short but moving service? Finally, with five Sundays in the month once more, the Benefice will worship all together at East Farleigh on November 30th.
