# This month's pastoral letter is provided by Christine Bostock

I am currently training to be a Guide at the Cathedral. The course is accredited by the Institute of Tourist Guides so it is not easy. Twelve of us started, I just hope 12 will finish!

It irritates me somewhat when people say it was Augustine who brought Christianity to Britain. He brought it to the Kingdom of Kent in 597 which is the year Columba died; who had already been Abbott of Iona for 35 years by then! In 604 Justus arrived to help Augustine and he was sent to Rochester. Our Cathedral is the second oldest foundation in the country, after Canterbury.

Justus founded a church in Rochester which was in need of repair when Gundulf arrived after the Norman Invasion. Gundulf demolished the church, moved it eastwards, and began to build the Cathedral which developed into the one we see today. So Rochester has stood witness to the Christian faith for over 1400 years. Gundulf also built the White Tower in London so we have a tenuous connection with the Tower of London.

The Prime Minister David Cameron recently proclaimed that "we are a Christian country and proud of it". Do you agree? Whose side are you on? Cathedral or Tower?

#### Food Banks and Ferraris

I recently listened to "Food Banks and Ferraris", a song by Sally Ironmonger, a singer-songwriter from the Medway towns. This song is a social commentary on those who have and those who haven't – and it really made me think. There are things that we as the general public see as a part of life. For example, going shopping in Maidstone, you will inevitably come across some people who are homeless, but this is normal right? All countries have people unfortunate enough to not have a home, so why should we be surprised that the same thing occurs here?

The answer to this question is that the UK is the 5th largest economy in the world. In itself, London is the biggest financial sector in the world, with other large cities such as Edinburgh and Glasgow in the top 100. Why on earth are there people living on the streets in the freezing cold when we as a country are doing so well for ourselves? In fact, because of the increasing amount of homeless people, there is a record high use of food banks in the UK. The latest figures published by the Trussell Trust show that 1,109,309 three day emergency food supplies were provided to people in crisis by the charity in the 2015/16 financial year, which is an increase of 2% on the previous year. How is it possible that people living in one of the wealthiest nations in the world can't afford to buy themselves food? And how have we become so self-involved that we don't notice it going on right beneath our noses?

Let's go back to the issue of the homeless, because I think that this is something that really needs to be paid attention to. According to the latest figures, there was an increase of 30% from 2014 to 2015 throughout the UK of rough sleeping, while since 2010 rough sleeping estimates show an increase of 102%. This means that on any one night, 3569 people are estimated to be sleeping rough. Is this acceptable? In Maidstone, rough sleeping is highly visible and there has been a tenfold rise in the number of households defined as homeless in the town. As I said before, I'm not shocked when I see rough sleepers in Maidstone – it's become the norm. I should be shocked, but it's too common. No one is immune to becoming homeless as there are many paths leading to this desperate place. What is the most shocking about the statistics regarding the homeless is that the average age of death for these people is 47 for men and 43 for women. If this doesn't prove that we have screwed up as a society, nothing will. If we aren't spending our billions of pounds on helping these people, what are the government's priorities? However, it's easy to blame people with more power than ourselves. What are our priorities? I could be out there fundraising to help these people, so why don't I? We concern ourselves with the TV, celebrity gosslp, where to go out for dinner etc. whilst others are wondering if they will get through the next night of sub-zero temperatures.

Now I'm going to go to the other end of the spectrum. In 2013 Ferrari sold more of its sports cars in Britain than in any other European country. This should give an indication of how wealthy we are as a whole. In fact, this year the richest 1000 people have more wealth than the poorest 40% of households. According to the Equality Trust, the richest 1000 saw their wealth increase by a staggering £28,508 billion – the equivalent of £78 million a day, or £901 a second. Just this increase could pay 20 years' worth of grocery bills for all of the UK's users of food banks.

From this article, I think we can pretty much say for certain that the gap is widening between the rich and the poor. Whilst the rich are buying their new 2016 model cars, others are losing their houses and in the worst cases, their lives. I appreciate that there is no simple solution, but poverty is real and here in the UK. More and more people are falling through the gaps in the welfare state safety net. It's a disgrace. I actually really want a response to this article from any local politicians who are reading it. Why is the situation getting worse and the gap between the richest and poorest growing? And what do you propose to do about it? In fact, I'd like to hear from anyone who has any thoughts or ideas about this topic.

## West Farleigh Parish Council Meeting

Here are extracts from the draft minutes of the meeting held at The Good Intent on Monday 21st March.

Present: Clirs B Scott (Chairman), Clirs M Merritt, G Martin (7.35pm), L Johnson, J Morgan, C Stockwell, Mrs A Broadhurst (Clerk), Borough Clir J Wilson and Community Warden Adam McKinley

PUBLIC DISCUSSION: There was discussion regarding the 30 mph sign which is repeatedly being removed in Charlton Lane. The Clerk confirmed that this has been reported to Kent Highways again, urging them to report the issue to Kent Police. Clir Scott stated that it was very disappointing as everyone had fought so hard to get the speed limit lowered. Dog fouling in the village was raised as a concern, especially as a resident has seen a fellow parishioner not clearing up after their dog. The Community Warden stated that he would be able to help tackle this issue and can also assist with reporting the matter to MBC. A resident raised concerns at the amount of litter in the village, in particular around Teston Lane, Ewell Lane (around the bus stop at the bottom), Hunt Street and from the junction of Teston Lane/Lower Road through to Kettle Lane. The Clerk informed all that she would report these areas to MBC and find out when the village is next due its litter pick. A resident asked whether there was any update on a meeting room for the Parish Council. Clir Scott stated that there had been discussion with the Sports Club and it may be possible to build a small meeting room, mainly to be used for Parish Council meetings. He added that approximately £15,000 has been saved and so the Parish Council is looking at the cheapest option for putting the money to good use. It was noted that the Police have historically stated that they could have more visibility in the village if there was a room to meet with residents in and the Community Warden added that he would be able to have surgeries with residents.

Highways Issues in West Farleigh: The Clerk reported that she has still not received any response from County Cllr Stockell regarding the various highways related concerns in the village. Borough Cllr Wilson stated that HGV issues in Kent need to be discussed and that another bridge is required in the area, through transport infrastructure improvements. He added that there is a lobbying day in Parliament soon and he is hoping that this can be raised. After further discussion it was noted that weight limits are put in place by KCC but enforced by Kent Police. Cllr Johnson stated that the potholes in Ewell Lane from Chariton Lane down have not been rectified. The Clerk offered to chase Kent Highways. It was noted that there is a large boulder sticking out from the verge in Ewell Lane- approximately 300m from the Green (Charlton Lane). This is extremely dangerous. A vehicle was witnessed hitting the boulder which forced the car into the middle of the road.

Roundabout in the Play Area: Cllr Scott reported that Councillors have spent some time dismantling the roundabout to see whether the bearing issue can easily be resolved. After investigation, and subsequent discussion with the supplier, it is likely that the repair will be in the region of £2,300. It was noted that there seems to be a design fault with this particular unit as there have been other reports in the Borough of the same issues. The Clerk reported that she has contacted various suppliers to investigate the cost of a new roundabout, which is more like the 'old fashioned' type (with easier to maintain parts) and the costs range between £3,000 and £6,000 but added that a site visit would be required to get an accurate price. After brief discussion Councillors felt that HAGS SMP should be approached to obtain a quotation, but Cllr. Martin asked that the Parish Council be informed of play areas where the roundabout has been installed approximately 2 years ago, so that Councillors can go and view before committing any money to the replacement.

Parish Council Marquee: Clir Scott reported that the marquee had been used at Clir Martin's Lambing Day last Sunday and it was noted that it could do with being professionally cleaned. Clir Johnson has contacted a local company in Barming who is able to complete this for approximately £50.00. All members were in favour.

Borough Councillor's Report: Borough Clir Wilson reported that MBC's Local Plan will go before the Inspector with a housing figure of over 18,500. He also reported that there is bad feeling relating to the Planning Department and decisions being made by the Officers and Planning Committee. Officers make the recommendations that go forward to the Planning Committee and because the Members of the Committee have less knowledge than the Officers, they do not like to go against the recommendations made. Clir Wilson said that it was very disturbing to see the extreme pressure placed on Members of the Planning Committee by the Chairman. Clir Scott added that the Parish Council would support any action taken against the Planning Department. Borough Clir Wilson reported that this would be his last meeting as he is standing down at the elections in May. Clir Scott thanked Clir Wilson for the support he has given the Parish Council over the years. Clir Martin thanked all who came to the Lambing Day, numbers were in the region of 230-240, which was a great turn out. Clir Scott thanked Clirs Martin and Morgan and also Clir Martin's wife (Candy) and son (Oilie) for making the day such a success. He added that it was lovely for approximately 70 children to be able to stand and watch a birth!

Pension Arrangements: The Clerk added that, later this year, the Parish Council will need to get a working group together to decide on the pension arrangements to be agreed for next April.

Local Needs Housing Survey: The Local Needs housing survey has been distributed by ACRK to all households in the village. These must be returned by 6th April. It was noted that the bungalows in the village, which were once controlled by the Parish Council and were for the older people of the village, have been taken over by Golding Homes and the residents are now much younger and have no association with West Farleigh. Councillors stated that, if there was a need identified, any scheme would have to be able to be protected for people with a connection to the village.

The Clerk reported that the Parish Council will come under a new audit regime next year, as a smaller Parish covered by the Transparency Code. However, all Councils must decide whether they wish to opt out of the current Smaller Authorities' Audit Appointment arrangements. Having read all of the corresponding documents, the Clerk recommended the Parish Council continue with the current arrangements, with all in favour.

The Clerk reminded all present that the Parish Council had awarded two grants last year, £600 to The Evergreens and £400 to the Church. After brief discussion it was proposed by Cllr. Martin to award the following: West Farleigh Evergreens £600 00 All Saints Church £400.00 Sports Club £510.39. Councillors then discussed the WI's application for a donation. Cllr. Merritt raised some concerns over the amount of work which is required at the hall. After brief discussion it was felt that no further money could be awarded this year.

The next full Council meeting will be held on Monday 16<sup>th</sup> May 2016 at 6.30 p.m, followed by the Annual Parish Meeting at 8.00 pm at The Good Intent. All Parishioners are welcome at this meeting.

Nature Notes: The Under Cover Collection.

I keep a sheet of corrugated iron lying flat on the ground in a "wild area" at the top of our garden. It's not exactly decorous but it serves its purpose and it's only visible when we visit that area. It compensates us fully for any unsightliness by regularly giving us a sight of small creatures that we would not otherwise often see-and in some cases gives us our only sightings of animals that make a real point of keeping out-of-view. Over the last half-dozen years we have lifted the sheet of iron to find yellow-necked and wood mice, field and bank voles, common shrews, and, among the reptiles, grass snakes and slow worms. Sometimes we have a toad, but frogs have become very rare in our garden. We have never yet had a lizard (has any one had one locally?), nor a dormouse, which I would regard as a most unlikely candidate, even supposing they inhabit the area around our garden, because their habits, during their season of activity, take them upwards into the trees and bushes. Weasels do occur in our garden but I have not had one hide in this place, easy as it would be for them to pursue these small mammals on which they prey.

When they are exposed by my lifting the sheet that covers them the various mammals behave in rather different ways. The mice run off into the surrounding vegetation and disappear very quickly, usually by more-or-less the shortest route. The voles are much slower. They can be reluctant at first to leave the nests, mainly of chopped up grass, that they have built under corrugations. Probably the unwonted light forces them out and they too then bumble across to the edge of the barer patch and disappear by burrowing into the grass and leaves, probably down the corridors which they regularly use. During the last week the resident of the patch has been a common shrew. This creature behaves differently. It is much quicker than a vole and only slower than a mouse by virtue of its smaller size. If the mice have some directional stability, however, the shrew has little or none. First it rushes in one direction, then stops, returns and stops again on the other extreme. Yet again it can't decide which way to go. Its long nose twitches and points in one direction, then another. Finally it takes another course altogether and dashes out of sight. All this takes no more than 3 or 4 seconds, but so much activity and indecision is packed into the little creature's movements that it seems much longer. Grass snakes take a time to react. As I have previously discussed in this column, they are sometimes in pairs or threes and, being either asleep or pre-occupied, have to wake up and compose themselves before making off.

In Quarry Wood there are also a few of these "refugia", as corrugated sheets are sometimes called. On the opposite banks of the Medway someone has in past years maintained more, which are great for slow worms in particular. Corrugated iron is just one material that can be used, but flat coverings, like carpet square or rubber mats are also perfectly good. The small mammals make burrows beneath the flat surface, attracted by the warmth and security on offer. Do try one in your own garden! Little time or effort is involved and it will not be long before it becomes a temporary home to some creature and gives opportunities to observe them. © Tim Hill
