

"Some sort of periodical is an essential life-line in a village such as ours"

On September 5th, ninety-eight working days (minus 7 lost through flooding) after work began, the most talked-of bridge over the Medway will be opened to two-way traffic and to any pedestrian who cares to use its hazard-free footway. What Teston and West Farleigh think of it now it is finished we have yet to learn, but our speculation last month brought quick reaction from Mr John Balston. Signing himself 'artist severely provoked', he wrote to Life-Line thus:

"So now you think that in the future we may be able to lean over the old bridge in 'peace', thrilled as we watch the Juggernauts roar past each other across the new one - the summer air redolent with the tang of diesel perfume. Mind you, to speed them on their way, one would have to knock a few houses down, straighten out one or two bends in those awkward country lanes, and, so that we can have the pleasure of listening to them thunder all through the night, one would have to link those pretty sodium vapour lamps in Coxheath with those at Wateringbury. It would be really rural then, wouldn't it? A great enhancement to one of the few beauty spots loft in Kent. But must we leave it there? For those who wish to improve those ancient monuments that have been entrusted to our care, something in the same vein might be done for other architectural treasures in the parish. How about, for instance, beautifying the south side of our church with a really up-to-date petrol service station? Have your car serviced outside while you are ministered to within. It might attract a larger congregation; moreover, if the sermon were overlong, one could listen to the whirr of the petrol pumps... One of the great charms of Teston Bridge was that one used to be able ee see its full length spanning the river, and at the same time it was set in a landscape of great merit. But, as I understand your editorial comment, people today may well prefer to watch the traffic go by (and this will certainly increase once you provide the facilities for it) than to look at the bridge and the landscape ... "

Life-Line is grateful to Mr Balston for having brought a laugh into the business of producing it. At the same time, he sets us wondering. How wide does a lorry have to be before it's a 'juggernaut'? Is it more, or is it less than the 6ft 6in restriction imposed on the bridge approaches? whence and why came the ugly word? Our dictionary declares a juggernaut to be "any idea, custom, fashion or the like to which one either devotes himself or is blindly or ruthlessly sacrificed". Maidstone's excellent Public Library quoted from their Oxford Dictionary thus: "Juggernaut: a title of Krishna, the 8th Avatar of Vishnu, the uncouth idol of this deity at Puri in Orissa, annually dragged in procession on an enormous car, under the wheels of which many devotees are said to have formerly thrown themselves to be crushed. The Dictionary of Slang had nothing to offer, and so we gave it up. At least the 'enormous car' seemed to have some relevance, but many a car today could cross the new bridge without offending our correspondent's eye or ear, and yet be called by some "enormous". For the benefit of the curious, we merely add that an Avatar is a descent from heaven, and that Orissa is a state of India south-west of Calculta.
